REGULATIONS RELATING TO SMALL-SCALE FISHING

I, Senzeni Zokwana, Minister of Agriculture, Forestry and Fisheries, hereby under sections 19 of the Marine Living Resources Act, 1998 (Act No. 18 of 1998), make the regulations in the Schedule.

SCHEDULE

Arrangement of regulations

1. Definitions
2. Process and procedures relating to the allocation of small-scale fishing rights
3. Time periods
4. Criteria for small-scale fishers, small-scale fishing communities and small-scale fishing rights allocation
5. Small-scale fishing areas and zones
6. Management of the rights of access
7. Short title

Definitions

1. In these Regulations any word or expression to which a meaning has been assigned in the Act shall have the meaning so assigned and, unless the context otherwise indicates—

“basket of species” means an arrangement where a pre-determined variety and quantity of marine living resources are allocated in terms of a small-scale fishing right in terms of a multi-species approach;

"Department" means the Department of Agriculture, Forestry and Fisheries;

"near-shore" means the region of sea (including seabed) within close proximity to the shoreline;

"the Act" means the Marine Living Resources Act, 1998 (Act No. 18 of 1998).

Process and procedures relating to the allocation of small-scale fishing rights

2. (1) Communities wishing to be recognised as small-scale fishing communities must register their expression of interest with the Department using the form as provided for in Annexure 1.

(2) The Department must conduct a verification procedure, in accordance with the time period specified in regulation 3, of each person considering themselves to be a small-scale fisher in each of the communities that have registered an expression of interest contemplated in sub-regulation (1).

(3) The verification procedure must be conducted in order to determine whether each person of the intended small-scale fishing community, meets the criteria of a small-scale fisher as set out in regulation 4(1).

(4) Communities may be required to assist the Department in verifying the small-scale fishers in their respective communities.

(5) The Department must publish, in relevant popular newspapers, a list of persons recognised as small-scale fishers per small-scale fishing community.

(6) The Department must assist small-scale fishing communities with the following:

- (a) Mobilizing and registering the small-scale fishing community as a co-operative;
- (b) identifying suitable species to be used for commercial purposes and for own consumption by the co-operative;
- (c) demarcating small-scale fishing areas in accordance with regulation 5;
- (d) applying for a small-scale fishing right in accordance with the criteria referred to in regulation 4(3).

Time periods

3. (1) Communities must be given a minimum of 30 days from date of publication of these regulations in which to register their expression of interest as contemplated in regulation 2(1).

(2) The Department must start the verification procedure contemplated in regulation 2(3) of small-scale fishers within 60 days after the expression of interest process has closed.

Criteria for small-scale fishers, small-scale fishing communities and small-scale fishing rights allocation

4. (1) The criteria to be applied in determining whether a person is a small-scale fisher are that the person must—

- (a) be a South African citizen who associates with or resides in the relevant small-scale fishing community;

- (b) be at least 18 years of age;
- (c) historically have been involved in traditional fishing operations, which include catching, processing or marketing of fish for a cumulative period of at least 10 years; and
- (d) derive the major part of his or her livelihood from traditional fishing operations and be able to show historical dependence on fish, either directly or in a household context, to meet food and basic livelihoods needs.

(2) A small-scale fishing community shall only be recognised as such if it contains a minimum of 20 small-scale fishers.

(3) A small-scale fishing right must only be allocated to one co-operative per small-scale fishing community that has as its membership all the verified small-scale fishers of that small-scale fishing community.

(4) Other relevant criteria include the following:

- (a) Only a small-scale fisher shall be a member of a co-operative;
- (b) a small-scale fisher shall not own or be part-owners of a commercial fishing right;
- (c) a small-scale fishing community must have a management plan that must specify—
 - (i) what marine resources it would use and how the species would be utilized;
 - (ii) reporting mechanisms;
 - (iii) training and development support needs;

- (iv) measures to promote involvement of women and persons with disability;
- (v) social responsibility measures for child-headed households that are dependent on marine resources;
- (vi) social responsible measures for the youth to improve their levels of education and to provide opportunities for the youth to gain experience in the small-scale fishing sector; and
- (vii) those services that will be outsourced by the small-scale fishing community.

Small-scale fishing areas and zones

5. (1) In order to facilitate the establishment of areas where small-scale fishers may fish, the Department must set up a procedure to engage and consult with the small-scale fishing community in proposing demarcated areas that may be established as areas where small-scale fishers may fish.

(2) For the purposes of sub-regulation (1), the demarcation must –

- (a) be done in a manner that reduces conflict between small-scale fishing communities; and
- (b) take into account the mobility of each species in the allocated basket of species with sessile species requiring smaller fishing areas while nomadic and migratory species requiring larger areas.

(3) If there are other activities that have a proven severe impact on the fishing activities of a small-scale fishers the Department shall by means of

Gazette establish exclusive zones which can either regulate or prohibit these activities from operating in that area.

Management of the rights of access

6. (1) The list and quantity of fish species to be allocated for commercial and own consumption purposes for each small-scale fishing community shall be considered after consultation with the relevant small-scale fishing community and by considering the following:

- (a) the request from the small-scale fishing community to fish for particular near-shore species found within the fishing area of that small-scale fishing community;
- (b) the number of small-scale fishing community in the region competing for the same resources;
- (c) whether the marine species will be used by the small-scale fishing community for commercial purposes or for own consumption;
- (d) fish species that are listed on the non-saleable list in columns 1 and 2 of Annexure 2 shall only be caught for own consumption within the corresponding limits specified in columns 3 and 4 of Annexure 2;
- (e) fish species that are listed on the non-saleable optional list in columns 1 and 2 of Annexure 2 may be caught for own consumption within the corresponding limits specified in columns 3 and 4 of Annexure 2;
- (f) fish species that are listed on the prohibited list as contained in Annexure 3, shall not be landed;

- (g) fish species listed on the permitted commercial list in columns 1 and 2 of Annexure 4 may be used for commercial purposes within the corresponding limits specified in columns 3 and 4 of Annexure 4;
- (h) if species listed on Annexure 4 are to be requested for own consumption instead of commercial use then all measures pertaining to these species will be aligned to own consumption, including the basket of fish species shall not exceed 10 fish per person per day;
- (i) invertebrate species listed in columns 1 and 2 of Annexure 5 shall only be used for own consumption within the corresponding limits specified in column 3 of Annexure 5;
- (j) any other non-listed species may be requested for commercial use or for own consumption subject to approval from the Department;
- (k) in general, species requested by a small-scale fishing community for commercial purposes may not be used for own consumption and vice versa;
- (l) species used for own consumption shall not be sold, but may be bartered within the local community;
- (m) small-scale fishing communities shall not exploit organisms or fish in estuaries for commercial purposes, unless specifically approved in the basket of species;
- (n) species requested for own consumption shall be made available for fishing to all small-scale fishers of a small-scale fishing community ;
- (o) catching of fish for own consumption shall be limited to shore-based activities;
- (p) in general, control measures pertaining to species used for own consumption shall be aligned with control measures established for the recreational sector (including bag limits, size limits, closed seasons etc);

- (q) the quantum of fish and number of licences and permits allocated shall be based on the total allowable catch and total applied effort allocated to the co-operative for species used for commercial purposes;
- (r) the following gear types are prohibited in the small-scale fishing sector:
 - (i) bottom trawl;
 - (ii) mid-water trawl;
 - (iii) purse seine;
 - (iv) longline; and
 - (v) gill nets south of Yzerfontein; and,
- (s) vessel size limitations shall be in principle aligned to the corresponding commercial fishery.

(2) Notwithstanding sub-regulation (1)(i), a small-scale fishing community has the authority to donate a portion of its commercial catch to its fishers for their own consumption: Provided that the amounts are accounted for against the allocation granted to the co-operative.

(3) (a) When granting a small-scale fishing right to a small-scale fishing community, the initial apportionment of quantum and fishing effort to be made commercially available to each small-scale fishing community must be considered after consultation with all affected small-scale fishing communities.

(b) The initial proportions agreed upon as contemplated in paragraph (a), must thereafter be used to apportion future annual small-scale fisheries total allowable catch and total applied effort allocated in a region.

(4) Should small-scale fishing communities not be able to agree on the apportionment of the total allowable catch and total applied effort allocated in the same region, the apportionment shall be determined having regard to—

- (a) accessibility to the resource by the small-scale fishing community;
- (b) the historical involvement of the fishers of the small-scale fishing community in the utilisation of the resource; and
- (c) the overall economic feasibility of the exploitation of the available species.

(5) A small-scale fishing community may request to expand the basket of species allocated to it in future years if the species requested are found within the fishing area of the co-operative and the resources will be used for food security purposes.

(6) In addition to sub-regulation (5) species which do not form part of existing Total Allowable Catch or Total Applied Effort apportionments may be considered for inclusion in the basket of species for commercial exploitation.

(7) small-scale fishing communities shall be represented at national, regional and local management structures as part of a co-management approach in managing resource access or to address any other related operational matter.

(8) Quanta and fishing effort as part of commercial fishing rights, which are suitable for small-scale fisheries, may be transferred to small-scale fishing communities subject to meeting all conditions for the transfer.

(9) Transferred quanta or fishing effort referred to in sub-regulation 8 shall be used under the management framework for small-scale fisheries.

(10) (a) To improve beneficiation to small-scale fishers and to enhance the negotiation powers of small-scale fishing communities, small-scale fishing communities shall form secondary co-operatives with other small-scale fishing communities and shall only process and market wild captured marine resources through the secondary co-operative by the third fishing season of the small-scale fishing right been granted.

(b) To order to achieve the objective of paragraph a, small-scale fishing communities are required to become a member of at least one secondary co-operative which has applied for a fish processing right during the second fishing season after the small-scale fishing right has been granted.

Short Title

7. These regulations are called the Regulations Relating to Small-scale Fishing, 2015.
